Word of advice to all present and future students of SVC; to achieve success, one should have discipline, dedication and determination which has been my motto from the time I was a student. Self-discipline is paramount and students can become more focused and concentrate in their studies through meditation practice. Students who have disciplinary issues and have to be counseled by teachers and administration all the time have many disadvantages. They have the negative energy flowing through words uttered by the counselling teacher plus it is a waste of time for both the teacher and the student. Teachers are also reminded all the time to show love and care since the students stay with them for 8 hours during the day and some students come from broken families or

shift work parents who don't spend time with them. We as Administrators and leaders guide the teachers to show affection and care which can help them succeed in life.

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Opportunities must be given to students to participate in all types of non-academic activities such as sports, Visual Arts, Performing Arts, essay writing competitions, oratory and many more. 

The Child Protection Officer

"A child protection policy has been designed by Ministry of Education as well as Rama Krishna Mission to provide guidelines for schools to create safe environments for children.

Every child has the right to be protected from abuse, neglect, harmful cultural practices, any forms of violence, inhumane treatment and punishment, and hazardous and exploitative labour.

Furthermore, child abuse has risen rapidly in Fiji, not only in homes and on the streets but also in schools.

Unfortunately, researches strongly suggest the degrading and long term effects of such abuse on the victims like; shock, fear, guilt, shame, depression and inability to trust others. Besides, there is also the social shame attached to abuse.

Keeping students safe is everyone's responsibility. A child protection policy has been designed by Ministry of Education as well as Ramakrishna Mission to provide guidelines for schools to create safe environments for children.

Some of the issues that we look at are:

- All forms of physical or mental abuse (violence), neglect or negligent treatment, maltreatment or exploitation, including sexual abuse
- Torture or other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment
- · Promote their physical recovery, social reintegration and compensation in the event of any abuse or maltreatment.
- · Any work that is detrimental to the child's health and physical development.

ICT Report

In this era of computers, here at Swami Vivekananda College we provide best ICT infrastructure to our teachers and students to experience 21st century teaching and learning tools.

2019 started off with some major upgrade in the ICT infrastructure which includes:

Firstly, moving from the domain setup to remote setup. The School has bought new Terminal server which the teachers can access remotely within the school network and as well as outside the school network

Secondly, upgrading the projectors in the classrooms and Labs with a 55inch LED TV screens.

Currently we have a Terminal Server, File Server, ESET Antivirus Server, 2x Network Attached Storage for backups, a firewall system and CCTV surveillance system which covers the whole School boundary.

Major Achievement

The major project of Ramakrishna Mission for this year was the launching of mVuli, an online curriculum for the students not only in Swami Vivekananda College but for all students throughout Fiji. It brings directly to students the world's most comprehensive digital K-12 curriculum from Learnetic in Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry and Biology from year 9 to year 13 with hundreds of highly interactive lessons. The school has immensely grown in terms of upgrade on ICT assets and digital learning facilities.

Gender Equality

The issue of gender equality has been generally examined in philosophical literature and broad communications sources. In any popularity based society, sexual orientation equity is viewed as a significant good rule that ought to be trailed by all individuals from society. Looking into moral hypotheses, it is conceivable to apply the centre standards of every one of the speculations to the issue of sex balance so as to recognize the moral hypothesis that gives the most attractive good response to the issue and the moral hypothesis that gives the least agreeable response to the issue of sexual orientation correspondence. The three speculations that will be examined in this paper incorporate utilitarianism, prudence morals, and women's activist hypothesis. The issue of gender equality is related with human qualities and the socially built procedure of creating esteems in people. Also, the issue of gender equality joined with the development of social developments may result in the advancement of sex correspondence at the worldwide dimension. Gender equality can be found at home, at work and even in schools. Also, different female generalizations displayed in Disney Films show ladies various things that are related with sexual orientation imbalance. For instance, in Beauty and the Beast, young ladies are educated to acknowledge that men are prevailing seeing someone.

There are the two qualities and shortcomings, which can be distinguished for every one of the moral speculations as connected to the issue of gender equality. So as to distinguish the moral hypothesis that gives the most acceptable good response to the issue, it is important to allude to the qualities of the moral speculations talked about in the past segment of the paper. To begin with, the qualities of utilitarianism incorporate two significant attributes of the hypothesis. The qualities of temperance morals incorporate the noteworthiness of individual honesty. The real quality of ethicalness morals is that it gives a chance to people to decide. Besides, goodness morals is firmly associated with down to earth morals, strengthening the self-sufficiency of people.

In addition, ladylike morals has its qualities in connection to various issues. The essential standards of women's activist morals incorporate the advancement of the attributes and qualities that are attached to ladies. The quality of a female way to deal with morals incorporates the impression of ladies' encounters. This moral hypothesis is gone for putting the plan of freedom, freedom, and correspondence in the bleeding edge (Jaggar). Along these lines, it is conceivable to distinguish the hypothesis that is superior to anything others on account of gender equality correspondence is a ladylike hypothesis. This moral hypothesis clarifies the need of the battle for equivalent rights in the working environment, at home, and in other open spots. This hypothesis advances the expanded job of assorted variety in human culture. Women's activist methodology is the most palatable good response to the issue of sexual orientation fairness as a result of promoter's changes in human culture dependent on the interests of ladies. The shortcoming of prudence morals is that this hypothesis isn't arranged to rule based morals. Righteousness morals may make certain social issues (Louden). The shortcoming of ladylike hypothesis is centered on the way that it manages mistreatment and segregation of ladies. Contemplating the shortcomings of the moral speculations examined in the paper, it is conceivable to recognize the moral hypothesis that gives the least tasteful response to the issue of gender equality. Virtue ethics is an ethical theory that may praise some virtues that are considered to be immoral. Besides, virtue ethics does not involve fundamental concepts, such as duty, obligation, and rights. As a result, this theory cannot deal in a proper way with some significant issues. Virtue ethics does not highlight the role of what makes the act or behaviour right and what makes it wrong. According to Louden, virtue ethics is dependent on the final end which influences human lives, but it may not be virtuous. The issue of equality requires promoting moral principles in relation to women.

Thus, it is necessary to conclude that ethical theories can be applied to different issues of public concern, including the issue of gender equality. The feminine theory is focused on basic moral insights in relation to gender equality because it highlights the necessity to handle discrimination of women, providing guidelines for morality and ethical consistency. This theory is considered to be the most satisfactory moral answer to the issue of gender equality, comparing with utilitarianism and virtue ethics.



Road accidents are the leading cause of death by injury and the tenth leading cause of death globally.

It's the developing countries that bear a large share of the burden and because road traffic injuries affect mainly males between 19 and 44 years old, this burden creates economic hardships due to the loss of family breadwinners.

Road traffic injuries are predictable and preventable, but good data are important to understand the ways in which road safety interventions and technology can be successfully transferred from developed countries where they been proven effective.

Some prevention interventions include managing risk exposure with land use as there is rapid motorization, coupled with poor road conditions, rapid population growth, lack of safety features in cars, crowded roads, poor road maintenance and lack of police enforcement. Improving public transportation systems can also reduce exposure. Planning and designing roads for safety as well as designing visible, crashworthy, smart vehicles are also ways to help prevent road accidents. But the basics are still just as important – know your road safety rules and buckle up. The latter is often ignored and could help save lives if enforced more. As a simple saying goes: "It is always better late than never arriving at all."








Sarada Medical Centre

Sarada Medical Centre (SMC) is a charitable medical service of Ramakrishna Mission which has been serving in Fiji since the 1930s. SMC was opened on 2nd July 2012 to provide quality health care to the poor and needy. To date 70,913 patients have been served at SMC. The Ramakrishna Mission and the Ministry of Health & Medical Services (MOHMS) signed a MOU on 8th Nov 2017 for collaboration.

General Outpatient Services & Pharmacy Services

- 1. Outpatient Services: SMC provides free outpatient services which includes consultations, nursing treatment and medications. 15,152 patients received medical consultation in from January 2019 to date. SMC is managed using "Evolution" a state of art clinic management software provided as a charity by Medtech Ltd, New Zealand
- Admin and Staffing: RKM provides management and administration through a Manager, Clinic nurse, receptionist and pharmacist. MOHMS provides doctors, a nurse and medication for free distribution. Indian Technical & Economic Cooperation (ITEC) volunteer Dr. Prem Chaudhary joined in August 2019.
- 3. Pharmacy Services: Drugs and consumables are supplied by the Fiji Pharmaceutical and Biomedical Services on a quarterly basis. 16,712 medications were dispensed from the SMC pharmacy since January 2019.



Other Services: Tele-health services are provided by connecting patients to doctors in hospitals in USA, Hawaii. 9 Patients have been seen through Tele-heath since January 2019.

Support to Nadi Hospital: Digital Mammogram and a digital EST machines was handed over to Nadi Hospital on 14th September by Ramakrishna Mission with a vision that Nadi Hospital Staff can diagnose Breast Cancer and Cardiac Patients early and prevent early deaths amongst the people. Swami Bodhasarananda (Assistant General Secretary RKM, Belur Math, India) was part of the handing over.



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
